1. On 14th March 2026, while returning from work, Shyam misplaced his bag, which contained essential documents from work along with his Election card (voter ID card) and PAN card. Draft an F.I.R. reporting about the missing election card and PAN card, so that the same can be re-issued.
2. Binita Das got married to Suresh Singh on 12th April, 2020. After marriage, she wants to change her name to Mrs. Binita Singh. As her legal counsel, draft an Affidavit stating the above changes concerning her name.
3. Mr. Rakesh borrowed Rs. 70,000 from Mr. Kumar for the purchase of his new car on 18th April 2023. As promised between the parties, Mr. Rakesh pays back the borrowed amount to Mr. Kumar on 23rd June, 2026 along with Rs. 600 as interest on the said amount. Draft a Money Receipt, which Mr. Rakesh shall receive after making the complete payment.

PRACTICAL ASPECT

- I. **MODULE I: History of Legal Profession in India** This module contains the study of the legal profession in India in ancient, medieval and especially the changes which the profession underwent during British rule and other related aspects essential to understand the history of the legal profession in India.
- II. **MODULE II: Professional Ethics and Duties of Lawyers** This module includes issues like the need and necessity of ethics in the legal profession, relevant theories explaining its value and relevance in the legal profession. In addition, the duties of lawyers towards their clients, the court, the public, their fellow attorneys, self, society, etc., will also be discussed. The Indian code of ethics will be discussed in comparison with that of the American Code. The module will also include the role played by a lawyer in the administration of justice and an advocate's duty towards legal reform and duty to provide legal aid, etc.
- III. **MODULE III: Advocates Act, 1961** This module covers the Advocates Act, 1961 and relevant provisions of the Bar Council of India Rules.
- IV. **MODULE IV: Rights and Limitations of such Rights** The core contents of this module are the right to practice (Constitutional and Statutory Basis), the Impact of Technology on Legal Practice, the right to argue his case, and the right over his professional fees. Decisions of courts on the Advocate's right to strike will be the subject of deliberation. Conflicts of interest, lawyers versus clients' interests and limitations of the rights of lawyers, including restrictions on advertising, bar on Advocates from carrying on other professions, etc., will also be taken up for discussion.
- V. **MODULE V: Liability for Deficiency in Service and other Wrongs Committed by Lawyers** This module includes the essential skills of a lawyer, case laws, and relevant enactments like the Consumer Protection Act, 2019, the Contempt of Court Act, 1971, etc., which impose liability upon an advocate for the wrongs he commits in the course of his professional service.
- VI. **MODULE VI: Impact of Globalisation on Legal Services in India.** The following important topics will be taken up for class discussion during the course: Impact of Globalisation on the legal profession, Legal outsourcing in India, Role of an advocate in providing legal aid services, Advocate's role in outside court/informal settlement of disputes, age bar and entry into practice.

Problems: (From Roll No. 1 to 25)

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neither paid the decretal amount nor complied with the judgment. Instead, he has transferred one of his commercial properties to his brother with the intention of defeating the execution of the decree. The decree holder has discovered that the judgment debtor owns several bank accounts, motor vehicles and a three-storeyed commercial building in Siliguri. Draft an Execution Petition before the appropriate court seeking attachment and sale of the judgment debtor's movable and immovable properties, garnishee orders against his bank accounts and any other consequential relief.

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A renowned hotel located on Mall Road, Darjeeling, has entered into a contract with a construction company for renovation of its heritage building. During the course of renovation, the contractor has started demolishing portions of the structure beyond the approved architectural plan, causing irreversible damage to the heritage property. The hotel management has repeatedly requested the contractor to stop the illegal demolition, but the contractor continues the work, claiming contractual authority. The hotel approaches the Civil Judge (Senior Division), Darjeeling, seeking urgent interim protection until disposal of the suit. Draft an application under Order XXXIX Rules 1 and 2 of the Code of Civil Procedure seeking a temporary injunction.

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A journalist based in Siliguri published a series of investigative reports exposing illegal sand mining activities in the Teesta River. Shortly thereafter, multiple criminal cases were registered against him in different districts of West Bengal on similar allegations. He contends that the proceedings are malicious, intended to suppress freedom of speech and violate his fundamental rights guaranteed under Articles 14, 19 and 21 of the Constitution of India. Since the issues involve enforcement of fundamental rights across multiple jurisdictions, he decides to approach the Supreme Court directly under Article 32. Draft the writ petition seeking appropriate constitutional remedies.

Question 4 – Draft a Criminal Revision Petition

The Judicial Magistrate at Kalimpong convicted Mr. Rahul Pradhan for the offence of criminal trespass and sentenced him to one year of simple imprisonment. The accused contends that the trial court ignored material defence evidence, relied upon contradictory witness statements and failed to appreciate documentary records proving lawful possession of the disputed property. Instead of filing an appeal immediately, he seeks revision before the Sessions Court challenging the legality, propriety and correctness of the order. Draft a Criminal Revision Petition containing all relevant facts, grounds and prayers.

Question 5 – Draft a Complaint for Medical Negligence

A pregnant woman residing in Islampur was admitted to a private nursing home for delivery. Despite repeated complaints regarding excessive bleeding, the attending doctor failed to provide timely treatment or refer her to a higher medical centre. The patient suffered severe complications resulting in permanent disability. The family alleges gross medical negligence supported by expert medical opinion and hospital records. They seek criminal prosecution as

well as appropriate legal action before the competent Magistrate's Court at Islampur. Draft a detailed criminal complaint setting out the allegations, supporting facts and reliefs sought.

Question 6 – Draft a Memorandum of Civil Revision

The Civil Judge (Junior Division), Cooch Behar, rejected the defendant's application for amendment of the written statement after commencement of trial. The defendant contends that the amendment became necessary only after obtaining certified copies of government records which revealed material facts affecting the ownership of the suit property. He argues that refusal of amendment will result in failure of justice and multiplicity of proceedings. Draft a Civil Revision Petition before the High Court challenging the order of the trial court.

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Mr. Suman Chhetri, owner of a tea processing unit in Mirik, requires financial assistance of ₹1.5 crore for expansion of his business. The State Bank of India, Siliguri Branch, agrees to sanction the loan on the security of his factory premises and adjacent land. The borrower agrees to repay the loan in monthly instalments over ten years with interest. The bank insists upon clauses relating to inspection, insurance of the property, default, acceleration of repayment and the bank's right to enforce the security in case of default. Draft a legally valid registered mortgage deed incorporating all essential terms and conditions.

Question 8 – Draft a Gift Deed

Mrs. Madhuri Sen, aged 68 years, resides in Jalpaiguri and owns a two-storeyed residential house acquired through inheritance. Having no children of her own, she wishes to gift the property absolutely and voluntarily to her niece, who has been caring for her for several years. The gift is made out of love and affection without any monetary consideration. The donor is of sound mind and intends to transfer immediate possession of the property. Draft a registered Gift Deed suitable for execution before the Sub-Registrar, Jalpaiguri.

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A group of social workers from Siliguri intends to establish a charitable trust named "North Bengal Legal Aid and Education Trust" for promoting free legal aid, legal awareness, scholarships for economically weaker students and assistance to victims of natural disasters across North Bengal. The founders contribute an initial corpus of ₹15,00,000 and propose a Board of five trustees with clearly defined powers, duties and procedures for administration of the trust. Draft a comprehensive Trust Deed incorporating all essential legal provisions governing charitable trusts.

Question 10 – Draft a Power of Attorney

Mr. Arindam Dutta, a businessman residing in Alipurduar, has accepted long-term employment in Singapore for five years. During his absence, he wishes to authorise his elder sister to manage all his immovable properties situated in Alipurduar and Siliguri, collect rent from tenants, pay municipal and revenue taxes, execute lease agreements, appear before government authorities, represent him before civil courts whenever necessary and sign documents relating to the

management of his properties. Draft a General Power of Attorney containing all necessary powers, limitations, revocation clause and execution formalities.

Problems (From Roll No. 26 to rest)

Question 1 – Draft a Plaint for Recovery of Possession and Permanent Injunction

Mr. Rakesh Sharma purchased a residential plot measuring 6 kathas at Dagapur, Siliguri, through a registered sale deed in 2018. He has been paying municipal taxes regularly and possesses all revenue records. In January 2026, while he was temporarily residing in Kolkata for medical treatment, his neighbour, Mr. Dipankar Roy, illegally erected a boundary wall over nearly one and a half kathas of the property and started constructing a garage. Despite repeated requests and a legal notice, Mr. Roy refused to vacate the encroached land, claiming that the land belonged to his ancestors. Rakesh obtained a survey report from the Siliguri Municipal Corporation confirming the encroachment. Draft a detailed plaint to be filed before the appropriate Civil Judge's Court at Siliguri seeking recovery of possession, mandatory injunction for demolition of the illegal structure, permanent injunction restraining further encroachment, costs of the suit and other consequential reliefs.

Question 2 – Draft a Written Statement

A suit for recovery of ₹18,50,000 has been instituted before the Court of the Civil Judge (Senior Division), Jalpaiguri. The plaintiff alleges that the defendant borrowed the money in 2023 and failed to repay despite several demands. The defendant admits that he received only ₹8,00,000 as a business investment and not as a loan. He further contends that the plaintiff has fabricated the promissory note by altering the amount and date. The defendant also claims that the suit is barred by limitation and has been filed with mala fide intentions to harass him. Draft a comprehensive written statement raising all legal and factual defences available under the Code of Civil Procedure.

Question 3 – Draft a Criminal Complaint

Mrs. Ananya Das, a school teacher residing at Cooch Behar, received repeated threatening phone calls demanding ₹10 lakh. Unknown persons also circulated morphed photographs of her on social media, damaging her reputation. She approached the local police station twice, but no FIR was registered despite submitting written complaints. She now intends to approach the Chief Judicial Magistrate, Cooch Behar, under Section 223 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023, seeking appropriate directions. Draft a criminal complaint containing all necessary facts, jurisdictional details and prayer.

Question 4 – Draft a Bail Application

A university student from North Bengal University has been arrested by the Pradhan Nagar Police Station, Siliguri, on allegations of voluntarily causing hurt and criminal intimidation during a student election clash. The prosecution alleges that he assaulted another student with a wooden stick. CCTV footage produced by the defence shows that he was trying to separate the rival groups rather than participating in the assault. The accused has no criminal

antecedents, is pursuing his final semester examinations and has cooperated with the investigation. Draft a regular bail application before the Sessions Court, Darjeeling.

Question 5 – Draft a Writ Petition under Article 226

A group of tea garden workers employed in a tea estate near Nagrakata, Jalpaiguri, have not received wages for six consecutive months. The management has abandoned the estate, and despite repeated representations to the Labour Department and the District Magistrate, no effective action has been taken. The workers are facing starvation and lack of medical facilities. They seek intervention from the Calcutta High Court, Circuit Bench at Jalpaiguri, for enforcement of their constitutional and statutory rights. Draft a writ petition under Article 226 seeking appropriate writs and interim relief.

Question 6 – Draft a Public Interest Litigation

Residents of several villages along the Mahananda River in Siliguri have complained that untreated industrial waste from nearby factories is being discharged into the river, contaminating drinking water and causing serious health problems. Local authorities have failed to enforce environmental laws despite repeated complaints and reports from environmental experts. A registered environmental organisation based in Siliguri decides to approach the High Court in public interest. Draft a Public Interest Litigation seeking environmental protection, restoration of the river, constitution of an expert committee and compensation for affected residents.

Question 7 – Draft a Memorandum of First Appeal

The Court of the Civil Judge (Junior Division), Alipurduar, dismissed a suit for specific performance of a contract relating to the sale of agricultural land. The trial court held that the plaintiff failed to prove readiness and willingness to perform his part of the contract. The plaintiff contends that documentary evidence, including bank statements, notices and witness testimony, clearly established his financial capacity and willingness, but the trial court ignored the evidence and misapplied settled legal principles. Draft a Memorandum of First Appeal before the District Judge, Alipurduar.

Question 8 – Draft a Lease Deed

Mr. Prabir Ghosh, owner of a commercial building situated at Hill Cart Road, Siliguri, agrees to lease the ground floor to M/s Himalayan Pharmacy for running a retail medical store. The lease is for seven years with a monthly rent of ₹85,000 and a refundable security deposit of ₹5,00,000. The tenant shall bear electricity charges, maintain hygiene, obtain all statutory licences and shall not sublet the premises without written consent. The landlord reserves the right to inspect the premises after giving reasonable notice. Draft a legally valid lease deed incorporating all essential clauses.

Question 9 – Draft a Registered Sale Deed

Mrs. Sangita Roy, residing in Darjeeling, has agreed to sell her residential house situated at Matigara, Siliguri, to Mr. Tenzing Lepcha for ₹72,00,000. The purchaser has already paid ₹12,00,000 as earnest money through bank transfer, and the balance is to be paid at the time of

registration. The property is free from all encumbrances, taxes have been paid up to date and vacant possession is to be handed over immediately after execution of the deed. Draft a complete registered sale deed suitable for presentation before the office of the District Registrar, Siliguri.

Question 10 – Draft a Will

Mr. Nirmal Chatterjee, aged 72 years, residing at Hakim Para, Siliguri, is a retired government employee. He owns a residential house in Siliguri, agricultural land in Jalpaiguri, fixed deposits in two nationalised banks and shares in several listed companies. He wishes to bequeath the residential house equally to his two daughters, the agricultural land to his only son and the fixed deposits to his wife during her lifetime, with the remainder passing equally to all three children after her death. He also intends to appoint his eldest daughter as the executor of the Will and expressly revoke all previous Wills executed by him. Draft a legally valid Will containing all necessary clauses, declarations, attestation requirements and schedules of property.

As per the agreement, Ramesh paid an advance of ₹8,00,000 out of the total contract value of ₹20,00,000. The work was to be completed by 30.06.2024. However, Suresh failed to complete the work within the stipulated time and also abandoned the construction midway after taking the advance. Despite repeated demands and a legal notice sent on 15.07.2024, Suresh neither refunded the advance nor completed the construction. Assume you are the lawyer for Mr. Ramesh. Draft a Plaint to

- be filed before the Civil Judge (Senior Division), Siliguri, claiming recovery of the advance amount along with damages for breach of contract.
2. Mr. Arjun, a resident of Darjeeling, agrees to sell his residential house situated in Siliguri to Mr. Karan for a consideration of ₹50,00,000. An advance of ₹10,00,000 is paid by Karan on the date of the agreement (01.02.2025), and the balance ₹40,00,000 is agreed to be paid at the time of registration of the sale deed on or before 31.03.2025. Arjun is ready to execute the sale, but Karan refuses to pay the remaining consideration, alleging defects in the property title. Arjun now approaches you for drafting the necessary conveyance document.  4. Mr. Sohan filed a civil suit in the Court of the Civil Judge (Senior Division), Siliguri, against Mr. Mohan for recovery of ₹3,00,000. After a full trial, the Court dismissed Sohan's suit on 30.06.2025, holding that he failed to prove the loan transaction. Sohan, being aggrieved by the judgment and decree, intends to challenge it before the District Court, Darjeeling. Assume you are the advocate for Mr. Sohan. Draft a Memorandum of Appeal to be filed before the District Court, setting out the grounds of challenge against the trial court's judgment.
 5. Mrs. Neeta, a resident of Siliguri, purchased a washing machine from XYZ Electronics on 01.03.2025 for ₹40,000 with a one-year warranty. Within two months, the machine stopped working. Despite repeated requests, the company failed to repair or replace the machine. On 15.05.2025, Neeta sent a written complaint to the company, but no action was taken. She now wishes to approach the Consumer Commission. Assume you are the

- advocate for Mrs. Neeta. Draft a Consumer Complaint under the Consumer Protection Act, 2019, to be filed before the District Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission, Siliguri, claiming refund, compensation, and costs.
6. Mr. Rajesh lent ₹2,00,000 to his friend Mr. Vinay on 01.01.2025. Vinay issued a cheque dated 01.07.2025 drawn on his ICICI Bank account, Siliguri branch, for repayment of the said amount. Rajesh presented the cheque in his bank, but it was returned unpaid with the remark “Insufficient Funds”. On 10.07.2025, Rajesh received the return memo from the bank. Assume you are the advocate for Mr. Rajesh. Draft a Legal Notice under Section 138 of the Negotiable Instruments Act, 1881 to be served upon Mr. Vinay, demanding payment of the cheque amount within 15 days.
 7. M/s Sunrise Constructions Pvt. Ltd. Entered into a contract with M/s Green Valley Resorts Ltd. For construction of a hotel in Siliguri on 01.04.2023. The contract contained an arbitration clause stating that “any dispute arising shall be referred to arbitration.” A dispute arose regarding delayed payments, and Sunrise Constructions invoked the arbitration clause by sending a notice on 01.05.2025, suggesting appointment of an arbitrator. Green Valley Resorts failed to respond. Assume you are the advocate for Sunrise Constructions Pvt. Ltd. Draft an Application under Section 11 of the Arbitration and Conciliation Act, 1996 before the Hon’ble High Court at Calcutta, seeking appointment of an arbitrator.
 8. The workers’ union of Siliguri Tea Processing Pvt. Ltd. raised a dispute regarding non-payment of overtime wages for the last six months. The matter was referred for conciliation before the Assistant Labour Commissioner, and during negotiations, the management agreed to pay 50% of the pending overtime dues immediately and the remaining 50% within two months. Both parties agreed to record this settlement in writing. Assume you are the legal advisor to the management. Draft a Settlement Agreement under Section 18 of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947, to be signed between the employer and the workers’ union, incorporating the terms of settlement.
 9. Mrs. Ananya married Mr. Rohit on 15.01.2018 according to Hindu rites and ceremonies in Kolkata. After marriage, they lived together at Siliguri. From the very beginning, Rohit treated Ananya with cruelty by physically and mentally harassing her. Despite repeated efforts by her family to reconcile, the ill-treatment continued. On 01.03.2024, Ananya left her matrimonial home and has been living separately since then. She now

wishes to file for divorce on the ground of cruelty under Section 13(1)(ia) of the Hindu Marriage Act, 1955. Assume you are the advocate for Mrs. Ananya. Draft a Petition for Divorce under Section 13(1)(ia) of the Hindu Marriage Act, 1955, to be filed before the District Court, Darjeeling.

10. Ms. Fatima Rahman, a student of Vivekananda Girls' High School, a fully government-aided institution in Siliguri, West Bengal, has been attending classes wearing a headscarf in accordance with her religious beliefs. On 15/07/2025, the Government of West Bengal issued a notification stating that students of fully government-aided schools are prohibited from wearing or displaying any religious symbols within the school premises. Ms. Fatima Rahman considers this notification to be arbitrary and unconstitutional, contending that it infringes upon her fundamental rights guaranteed under Articles 14, 19, and 25 of the Constitution of India. She seeks to challenge the notification by filing a petition under Article 32 before the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India. As her counsel, draft an appropriate Writ Petition challenging the validity of the said notification.

1. Roll Numbers 1 to 10
Mr. Ramesh, a resident of Kolkata, entered into an agreement with Mr. Suresh, a contractor from Siliguri, on 01.01.2024 for the construction of a residential house. As per the agreement, Ramesh paid an advance of ₹8,00,000 out of the total contract value of ₹20,00,000. The work was to be completed by 30.06.2024. However, Suresh failed to complete the work within the stipulated time and also abandoned the construction midway after taking the advance. Despite repeated demands and a legal notice sent on 15.07.2024, Suresh neither refunded the advance nor completed the construction.
Assume you are the lawyer for Mr. Ramesh. Draft a Complaint to be filed before the Civil Judge (Senior Division), Siliguri, claiming recovery of the advance amount along with damages for breach of contract.
2. Roll Numbers 11 to 20
Mr. Arjun, a resident of Darjeeling, agrees to sell his residential house situated in Siliguri to Mr. Karan for a consideration of ₹50,00,000. An advance of ₹10,00,000 is paid by Karan on the date of the agreement (01.02.2025), and the balance ₹40,00,000 is agreed to be paid at the time of registration of the sale deed on or before 31.03.2025. Arjun is ready to execute the sale, but Karan refuses to pay the remaining consideration, alleging defects in the property title. Arjun now approaches you for drafting the necessary conveyance document.
Draft a Sale Deed transferring ownership of the property from Mr. Arjun to Mr. Karan, ensuring that all essential clauses (description of property, consideration, delivery of possession, covenants, registration, and execution) are incorporated.
3. Roll Numbers 21 to 30
Mr. Ravi, a small shopkeeper in Siliguri, has been accused of committing the offence of cheating under Section 420 of the Indian Penal Code. It is alleged that he took an advance payment of ₹1,00,000 from a customer, promising to deliver certain goods, but failed to supply them. An FIR has been registered at Siliguri Police Station, and Ravi has been arrested. He is presently in judicial custody.

Assume you are the advocate for Mr. Ravi. Draft a Bail Application to be filed before the Court of the Chief Judicial Magistrate, Siliguri, seeking his release on bail. Ensure that you include grounds such as presumption of innocence, right to liberty, non-tampering with evidence, and willingness to furnish surety.

4. Roll Numbers 31 to 40

Ms. Priya, a postgraduate law student in West Bengal, applied for a government scholarship under a state welfare scheme. She fulfilled all eligibility criteria and submitted her application within the prescribed time. However, the authorities neither granted her the scholarship nor provided any reason for the rejection. Despite repeated representations, no action was taken. Feeling aggrieved, she decides to approach the High Court under Article 226 of the Constitution.

Assume you are the advocate for Ms. Priya. Draft a Writ Petition in the nature of Mandamus before the Hon'ble High Court of Calcutta, directing the state authorities to consider and release her scholarship benefits.

5. Roll Numbers 41 to 50

Mr. Sohan filed a civil suit in the Court of the Civil Judge (Senior Division), Siliguri, against Mr. Mohan for recovery of ₹3,00,000. After a full trial, the Court dismissed Sohan's suit on 30.06.2025, holding that he failed to prove the loan transaction. Sohan, being aggrieved by the judgment and decree, intends to challenge it before the District Court, Darjeeling.

Assume you are the advocate for Mr. Sohan. Draft a Memorandum of Appeal to be filed before the District Court, setting out the grounds of challenge against the trial court's judgment.

6. Roll Numbers 51 to 60

Mrs. Neeta, a resident of Siliguri, purchased a washing machine from XYZ Electronics on 01.03.2025 for ₹40,000 with a one-year warranty. Within two months, the machine stopped working. Despite repeated requests, the company failed to repair or replace the machine. On 15.05.2025, Neeta sent a written complaint to the company, but no action was taken. She now wishes to approach the Consumer Commission.

Assume you are the advocate for Mrs. Neeta. Draft a Consumer Complaint under the Consumer Protection Act, 2019, to be filed before the District Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission, Siliguri, claiming refund, compensation, and costs.

7. Roll Numbers 61 to 70

Mr. Rajesh lent ₹2,00,000 to his friend Mr. Vinay on 01.01.2025. Vinay issued a cheque dated 01.07.2025 drawn on his ICICI Bank account, Siliguri branch, for repayment of the said amount. Rajesh presented the cheque in his bank, but it was returned unpaid with the remark "Insufficient Funds". On 10.07.2025, Rajesh received the return memo from the bank.

Assume you are the advocate for Mr. Rajesh. Draft a Legal Notice under Section 138 of the Negotiable Instruments Act, 1881 to be served upon Mr. Vinay, demanding payment of the cheque amount within 15 days.

8. Roll Numbers 71 to 80

M/s Sunrise Constructions Pvt. Ltd. Entered into a contract with M/s Green Valley Resorts Ltd. For construction of a hotel in Siliguri on 01.04.2023. The contract contained an

arbitration clause stating that “any dispute arising shall be referred to arbitration.” A dispute arose regarding delayed payments, and Sunrise Constructions invoked the arbitration clause by sending a notice on 01.05.2025, suggesting appointment of an arbitrator. Green Valley Resorts failed to respond.
Assume you are the advocate for Sunrise Constructions Pvt. Ltd. Draft an Application under Section 11 of the Arbitration and Conciliation Act, 1996 before the Hon’ble High Court at Calcutta, seeking appointment of an arbitrator.
9. Roll Numbers 81 to 90
The workers’ union of Siliguri Tea Processing Pvt. Ltd.raised a dispute regarding non-payment of overtime wages for the last six months. The matter was referred for conciliation before the Assistant Labour Commissioner, and during negotiations, the management agreed to pay 50% of the pending overtime dues immediately and the remaining 50% within two months. Both parties agreed to record this settlement in writing.
Assume you are the legal advisor to the management. Draft a Settlement Agreement under Section 18 of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947, to be signed between the employer and the workers’ union, incorporating the terms of settlement.
10. Roll Numbers 91 to 100
Mrs. Ananya married Mr. Rohit on 15.01.2018 according to Hindu rites and ceremonies in Kolkata. After marriage, they lived together at Siliguri. From the very beginning, Rohit treated Ananya with cruelty by physically and mentally harassing her. Despite repeated efforts by her family to reconcile, the ill-treatment continued. On 01.03.2024, Ananya left her matrimonial home and has been living separately since then. She now wishes to file for divorce on the ground of cruelty under Section 13(1)(ia) of the Hindu Marriage Act, 1955.
Assume you are the advocate for Mrs. Ananya. Draft a Petition for Divorce under Section 13(1)(ia) of the Hindu Marriage Act, 1955, to be filed before the District Court, Darjeeling.
11. Roll Numbers 101 to 112
Ms. Fatima Rahman, a student of Vivekananda Girls’ High School, a fully government-aided institution in Siliguri, West Bengal, has been attending classes wearing a headscarf in accordance with her religious beliefs. On 15/07/2025, the Government of West Bengal issued a notification stating that students of fully government-aided schools are prohibited from wearing or displaying any religious symbols within the school premises.
Ms. Fatima Rahman considers this notification to be arbitrary and unconstitutional, contending that it infringes upon her fundamental rights guaranteed under Articles 14, 19, and 25 of the Constitution of India. She seeks to challenge the notification by filing a petition under Article 32 before the Hon’ble Supreme Court of India.
As her counsel, draft an appropriate Writ Petition challenging the validity of the said notification.
